moves it to her front garden. The whole community spruces up the bus and makes it a vibrant shared space for young and old. But when a tow truck arrives to take the bus away does clever Stella have a plan to save it? Graham's endearing tale has a multicultural, animal-loving, feel-good factor.



STUCK

By Oliver Jeffers (HarperCollins) \$29.95 (hardback), 3 years+

Jeffers has won a string of awards for his children's books featuring his unique figurative style and handwritten font. Stuck is no exception - the cute illustrations bring the innocent yet absurd story to life: when Floyd's kite gets stuck in a tree he throws all manner of things to try and dislodge

Tom wants to play at the pier but his mother warns of a fire-breathing dragon waiting to trick little boys. In a jaunty tumble of rhymes the dragon's evildoings are revealed. The twist comes when Tom does meet the dragon but

the dragon is not what is expected - he is afraid of boys - and the other side of the story is told. Fears give way to fun and foes become friends.
