

The use of stone gives a cool feeling to



the cafe. The Botticino and Golden Emperador marble floor echoes floor schemes seen elsewhere in the hotel. The floor has extra appeal with large broken glass terrazzo insets. The counter bar has a carved limestone facade.

"Because the cafe has such a strong connection to the outdoors, I furnished the interior like a gazebo or pavilion and made the ceiling look like a large-scale trellis," says Robert Ambulo.

The Wan Hao formal Chinese restaurant is new. It replaces the former restaurant with high-backed burgundy dining chairs with a traditional Chinese interior.

passageways are highlighted with brass strip inlays. The seating areas are carpeted in black.

Specially-created wall niches have white silk panels and black lacquer borders. These house large gold leafed wood panels carved with Chinese calligraphy.

Pinstripe curtains separate the open areas from the private dining booths. The fabric matches the tones of the wood panelled columns.
